Fox Lane High School Students Named Semifinalists & Commended Students in 2022 National Merit Scholarship Program

Fox Lane High School seniors Joshua Miller and Sebastien Schonfeld have been named semifinalists in the 2022 National Merit Scholarship Program. The duo are among 16,000 seniors nationwide who will compete for 7,500 National Merit Scholarships.

Juniors across the nation entered the program by taking the PSAT earlier this year. According to the National Merit Scholarship Program, semifinalists represent less than 1 percent of all high school seniors in the U.S.


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Fox Lane Middle School Takes **Literary Discussion Outdoors**

BCSD SUPERINTENDENT SEARCH CONTINUES

Since the announcement that Dr. Joel Adelberg will be retiring in June 2022, the Bedford Central School District Board of Education has been working to find the district's next superintendent. The Board partnered with a search firm that serves schools across the nation in their search for educational leaders.

In September, community members were invited to make their voices heard by participating in an anonymous online survey. The community was also invited to take part in virtual community forums.
